1. DEATHS AND ELECTIONS OF FELLOWS.—The Academy has lost eight Ordinary Fellows by death during the year: Professor J. L. Austin, Sir Ernest Barker, Dr. L. D. Barnett, Dr. R. W. Chapman, Sir Herbert Grierson, Professor H. D. Hazeltine, Sir Hersch Lauterpacht, and Dr. F. Waismann.

During the same period three Corresponding Fellows have died: Dr. Felix Jacoby, M. Georges Lefebvre, and Professor Erik Lindahl.

In July 1959 the following were elected to Ordinary Fellowship: Dr. H. Buchthal, Professor Bruce Dickins, Dr. A. B. Emden, Professor W. B. Emery, Dr. O. R. Gurney, Mr. G. S. Kirk, Dr. Thomas Parry, Professor M. M. Postan, The Rev. Professor H. F. D. Sparks, and Mr. J. E. S. Thompson.

At the same meeting the following were elected to Corresponding Fellowship: Professor V. Arangio-Ruiz, Professor V. N. Lasareff, Professor W. van Orman Quine, Professor I. A. Richards, and Professor G. Tucci.

The total number of Fellows before the elections of July 1960 was 225 Ordinary Fellows (including 38 Senior Fellows), 63 Corresponding Fellows, and 4 Honorary Fellows.

SUPPLEMENTAL CHARTER.—Her Majesty The Queen has granted a Supplemental Charter enabling the Academy to elect not more than four Fellows whose qualifications do not conform closely with the condition laid down by Article 6 of the Charter of Incorporation but are in the interests of the advancement of the objects of the Academy.

10. GRANTS FOR PERIODICALS.—The fund placed at the disposal of the Academy by the Nuffield Trustees for the subvention of 'central' periodicals came to its appointed end during the year. In large measure it had served its immediate function of enabling the selected journals to bring their matter up to date by disposing of the considerable backlog which had accrued during and since the war. The result has been in some cases to enlarge circulation on what is hoped may be a permanent basis; and incidentally the opportunity has been taken in a number of instances of improving type and format under expert advice provided by the Nuffield Foundation. Apart from these material effects the encouragement given to the journals in question was a timely stimulus in many ways to authors and editors, and the debt of learning to the Nuffield Trustees for grants which in the aggregate amounted to £20,000 is an appreciable one.

Now the Academy is happy to announce that for the next three years it will be enabled by the generosity of All Souls College, Oxford, to continue some part of this annual subvention. The College has generously agreed to place £3,500 annually for that period and purpose at the disposal of the Academy. The first awards will be made during the latter half of 1960.

11. 12. ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR COLONIAL TERRITORIES.

(i) *British Institute of History and Archaeology in East Africa*.—Further progress has been made in the establishment of this Institute on a working basis:

(a) Mr. Richard Goodchild, M.A., F.S.A., Controller of Antiquities in Cyrenaica and formerly on the staff of the British School at Rome, has been appointed Director, with effect from 1 September 1960.

(b) A suitable building has been secured at Dar es Salaam as the main headquarters of the Institute.

(c) Two studentships, each of £600 plus travelling expenses, have been advertised in connexion with the Institute, and applications will be reviewed by a Selection Committee in November 1960.

(e) The United Africa Company Limited has made a grant of £1,000 towards the cost of initial equipment.

(f) The Nuffield Foundation has made a grant of £5,500 to provide two studentships a year for three years.

(ii) *Aden*.—Mr. G. Lankester Harding, C.B.E., F.S.A., has continued the archaeological survey which, on representations submitted by the Academy, the Aden Colony and Protectorate had invited him to undertake in those territories. His interim report is as follows:

Firstly, in general I find the archaeology of the area disappointing; there are very few sites and all of them late, with the exception of Neolithic sites on the edge of the Ruba al Khali which I have not yet visited. There is absolutely no evidence for occupation between the Neolithic and about the 10th century B.C., which is very odd indeed. Unfortunately only two excavations have yet been carried out there, Miss Caton-Thompson's at Huraidhah in 1938 and the American work in Baihan in 1951-2. No pottery from the latter has yet been published, so we have only the excellent report of Miss Caton-Thompson for comparative material.

It is clear that what is needed is fairly long-term work on some site which would offer at least a chance of foreign connexions for dating purposes. The work in Baihan, while it has some useful carbon 14 controls, depends otherwise for its dating on the much disputed sequence and dates of the Quataban kings, at least in the earlier periods, and it would seem that any site in the interior would suffer from the same trouble. Apart from Baihan—which geographically and historically relates more to the East—I have seen no site in the Western Protectorate which would offer the sort of control I suggest. Furthermore, lack of security in the whole of that region is such that any work would be out of the question. Remains only the Eastern Protectorate, and one site at least there is hopeful. This is Husn al Ghurab, the ancient port of Qana, where indeed foreign connexions should exist. The town site is a fairly large one, but it is impossible to estimate whether there is any stratification as the whole place is covered over with drift sand. Looking down from the citadel hill one can see the outlines of buildings, even perhaps of streets, but on the actual surface there is little to be seen, and almost no pottery visible. Nor do there seem to be any signs of port installations, but probably then, as now, the dhows would anchor a little way out and unload on to small boats. The site is in a good area for security, water-supply is adequate, and the inhabitants of the little town of Bir Ali—mostly negroes—are friendly and co-operative. It is approximately 80 miles west of Mukalla, and the track is not at all bad now. Theoretically this should be the ideal site, but I can offer no guarantees!

There is no protection of ancient sites in the Protectorates whatsoever, nor do I see how this is to be achieved so long as present conditions prevail, when every petty ruler is his own law. The Aden Antiquities Law does not apply outside the Colony, and sites in the vicinity of towns are being torn to pieces for building stone. This is particularly the case at Timnah, where the cemetery is also being looted by the local Ashraf and the results sold to visitors. The place is most attractive to amateurs of archaeology, who like to spend a weekend digging up a tomb or two to see what they can find, and while one must be to a certain extent thankful to such who in the past—and the not so distant past—have rescued important inscriptions and objects, it should be firmly discouraged in these days.

The Museum in Aden is a pathetic affair, but it has never had anyone to look after it permanently. Now there is a proposal that the Government should acquire the Munkerjee collection, and if they do that a private individual has guaranteed £10,000 for building a new Museum. I have been asked to catalogue the collection for the Government, and naturally recommendations regarding the Museum come within the terms of reference. But

I want to see the scheme started first in case they take financial fright at what I have to recommend, and drop the whole thing.

Thus very briefly my first reactions to the survey; I shall present my report in a form suitable for publication, complete with drawings and photographs of the sites and the sherds, etc., which I have collected at each, and hope the Government will do something about it as I think it will be of more than just local interest. There were considerable savings on last year's budget as my assistant was not able to join me and there were savings on many other items. This year, barring unforeseen snags, my assistant will be with me, but perhaps what remains to be done will not take the full nine months, as I did most of the fieldwork during my last tour. I do not know whether anything can be done about an expedition to Bir Ali, but feel sure it would be well worth while, for though we know the general outline of the history of the area, we know virtually nothing of the archaeology, which is so very different from anything encountered in the north.

I propose to return to Aden shortly and shall stay until the job is completed.

13. ARCHAEOLOGY IN IRAN.—Whilst there are British Schools or Institutes of Archaeology both in Turkey and in Iraq, no systematic provision has yet been made for similar work in Iran, where many important problems await attention. Recently representations have been made from within Iran itself to the British Council and the Academy that the time is arriving for British enterprise in this field. Accordingly it has been arranged by the Academy and the Council that for an experimental period of one year from 1 September 1960 the Academy shall appoint an Archaeological Attaché to the British Council in Iran with a view both to widening the scope of the Council and to preparing the way for possible future development in the historical and archaeological field. The British Academy Attaché will be given office accommodation by the British Council, but his salary and working expenses will be provided by the Academy.

Accordingly, Mr. David Stronach, M.A., who has worked actively in the British Institute of Archaeology at Ankara, the British School of Archaeology in Iraq, and on the NW. Frontier of Pakistan, has been appointed to this experimental post. He will receive a salary of £1,000 for the year from the Academy's general fund, together with £1,000 from the Stein-Arnold Fund to enable him to carry out exploratory work at Yarim Tepe in north-east Iran under a permit granted to him by the Iranian Government.

It is hoped that this tentative collaboration with the British Council will not only open up a new approach for British students working in the Middle East, but will also serve as a pattern for similar interim developments elsewhere.

14. MEDIEVAL LATIN DICTIONARY.—The layout for the *Revised Word-List* has been approved, and the first instalment of the text should be in the hands of the Oxford University Press before the end of July 1960.

15. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—(1) The fourth fascicule of the *Prophetologium* has been published; (2) C. Høeg's *Con-tacarium Palaeoslavicum* (facsimile edition) will shortly be published; (3) M. Velimirović's book about the *Hirmologium Chilandaricum* will be published in the course of 1960; (4) H. J. W. Tillyard's *Pentecostarium* is with the printer; (5) Mr. Dmitriij Stefanović from Belgrade, working in association with Dr. E. J. Wellesz, has taken over from Professor Tillyard the transcription and commentary of the *Stichera for January*; he has completed the transcription and is engaged upon a study of the structure of the melodies.

16. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—The Editorial Committee met in Paris on 16–17 November 1959, and in London on 11–12 January 1960. It has been able to maintain a rate of publication of four fascicules a year, Fascicule 18 having been issued in November 1959 and Fascicule 19 in January 1960. Fascicule 20 will appear shortly, and Fascicule 21 is in first page proof. It has been decided to end Volume I with the completion of the letter 'B'. This will occur in Fascicule 21, which may therefore be of irregular length. At the same time the Committee has prepared a revised statement of transcription and abbreviations to appear in the bound volume. The new arrangement following the departure of Professor Schacht to Columbia University came into force in September 1959; this system had been worked out experimentally during the previous absence of Professor Schacht in the U.S.A., and with a few subsequent modifications is now working satisfactorily. During the academic year 1960–1, Dr. R. M. Savory will be absent in Canada and his place as Editorial Secretary in London will be taken by Mr. J. Burton-Page.

17. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—A meeting of the Standing Committee of the T.I.R. was held at Milan on 10 May 1960 under the chairmanship of Professor G. Lugli. Mr. J. B. Ward-Perkins represented the Academy. Active progress was reported in the preparation of the Ancyra-Iconium sheet, and a number of decisions taken in matters of detail and presentation.

Other sheets in progress are:

- (a) *Trieste* (Italy—Yugoslavia—Austria—Hungary). Virtually complete, but will have to be drawn. Being published commercially in Florence.
- (b) *Milan* (Italy—Germany—France—Switzerland). In active preparation, though not yet far advanced. The Swiss are being asked to back this.
- (c) *Paris* (France—Belgium—Netherlands). In active preparation. Being published in France.
- (d) *Ankara-Konya* (U.K.).

18. **THESAURUS LINGUAE LATINAE.**—The fund collected through the Academy for this work now amounts to £2,330.
19. **CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.**—Owing to the pressure of his new appointment as Dean of Wells Cathedral, Dr. Christopher Woodforde is unable to continue active participation in the *Corpus* and it may be some while before a suitable successor can be found.
20. **REPERTORY OF THE SOURCES OF MEDIEVAL HISTORY.**—Part I of the Repertory is now in proof and the sheets for A-L have been corrected and returned to Rome. It is hoped to have the proofs of Part I completed for the International Historical Congress at Stockholm in August 1960.
21. **CRITICAL EDITION OF THE GREEK NEW TESTAMENT.**—Steady progress has been made during the year. Several scholars are collating Greek manuscripts; two are working on the Greek Patristic material, Dr. Willis continues with the Latin versions and Professor Plumley with the Coptic. Progress on the papyri, particularly the Bodmer papyri, is good. Professor Kilpatrick spent a successful seven weeks on the Continent working on Greek and Latin manuscripts. There are no reports of new Greek texts this year, but one interesting Syriac one.
22. **ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION COMMITTEE FOR A SURVEY OF THE PROVISION FOR RESEARCH IN THE HUMANITIES AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES.**—The Committee appointed in 1957-8 to carry out a survey of the existing provision for research in the Humanities and the Social Sciences has held six further meetings. Having surveyed the large amount of material available from published sources, and memoranda kindly supplied by a number of bodies closely interested in the investigation, the Committee proceeded to hear oral evidence from representatives of a number of the more important bodies providing or concerned with the organization of facilities, financial or otherwise, for higher studies and research in subjects other than the natural sciences, and to study reports on the foreign visits made by its representatives. Those made earlier to the United States of America, Canada, and France were followed by similar investigations of conditions and organization in Holland and Western Germany. As on the earlier visits, the first-hand examination of common problems in other countries has proved invaluable.
- Much time has latterly been spent in drafting the various sections into which the Committee's report seems likely to fall, and in considering its final recommendations. To enable the work to be completed without undue haste the Officers of the Rockefeller Foundation have extended the period over which their grant is available until 31 December 1960.

The Committee again wishes to express its obligations to the bodies and persons who have helped it, especially in connexion with its investigations abroad.

23. **MEDIEVAL TEXTS.**—Whilst there is provision for some types of historical documents, especially those bearing on local history, there is at present none for texts of English origin illustrating the intellectual history of the Middle Ages. Accordingly the Council of the Academy has decided to publish a series of medieval texts dealing with this aspect of medieval thought and writing under the title of *AUCTORES BRITANNICI MEDII AEVI: Texts illustrating thought and learning in medieval Britain*. An editorial committee, under the Chairmanship of Professor M. D. Knowles, has been appointed and the first publication, namely *JOHN BLUND, Tractatus de Anima* by Daniel Callus, is now ready for printing. Other texts in active preparation are *Dicta Anselmi* by R. W. Southern and F. X. Schmitt, *ROBERT OF WINCHELSEY, Quaestiones* by Cuthbert Smith, and *Treatises of Uthred of Boldon* by Hugh Farmer.

24. **DELEGATION TO HUNGARY.**—At the invitation of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences a delegation of three Fellows of the Academy, namely Professor H. D. F. Kitto, Mrs. Joan V. Robinson, and Mr. A. J. P. Taylor, visited Hungary in April 1960 and was cordially received. The hope was expressed that this form of interchange might be further developed.

25. **ADDRESSES OF CONGRATULATION.**—An address of congratulation was sent to the Royal Society in connexion with the celebration of the Society's tercentenary in July 1960; and to the University of Natal in connexion with the University's Golden Jubilee in April 1960.

26. **SYLLOGE OF COINS OF THE BRITISH ISLES.**—The Committee's second volume, covering the rich and hitherto unpublished Anglo-Saxon sections of the Hunter and Coats Collections at Glasgow University, is due for publication in November after many unexpected delays. The author is Miss Anne Robertson, M.A. Awaiting publication are two pioneer studies based on coins in the British Museum: one is by D. F. Allen on the 'Coins of the Coritani' and the other by R. H. M. Dolley on the Hiberno-Norse series. Meanwhile two volumes covering the Ancient British and Anglo-Saxon coins in the Ashmolean Museum are in active preparation. The first of two Copenhagen volumes is expected by the end of 1961 and work has been begun on the Anglo-Saxon coins in the Chester Museum, where the local mint is excellently represented. Finally, Dr. J. P. C. Kent is doing preliminary work on a British Museum volume covering 'Siege Pieces and Provincial Mints of

Charles I'. This should form the nucleus for a series of seventeenth-century publications similar to those on Ancient British and Anglo-Saxon coins on which the committee began its work.

27. UNION ACADÉMIQUE INTERNATIONALE.—The 33rd Annual Meeting was held at Noordwijk aan Zee, 8-13 June 1959. The Academy's representatives were the President of the Academy and Professor R. A. B. Mynors, President of the U.A.I. The following matters in which the Academy has a direct interest are summarized from the Report of the Conference.

1. CORPUS VASORUM ANTIQUORUM.—The following fascicules had appeared: *Germany*: Leipzig 1 by Werner Müller. *Austria*: Vienna, Kunsthistorisches Museum 2 by F. Eichler. *France*: Louvre 12 by F. Villard. *Italy*: Museo Campano 3 by P. Mingazzini. The following fascicules were in the press: *Germany*: Altenburg 1 and 2 by E. Bielefeld; Mainz 1 by R. Hampe and E. Simon; Schloss Fasanerie 2 by F. Brommer. *U.S.A.*: Metropolitan Museum 3 (U.S.A. 12) by D. von Bothmer. *France*: Laon 1 by Mme J. M. de la Genière. *Italy*: Florence, Museo Archeologico 3 by Signorina Magi; Milan, Museo Civico 1 by G. Belloni. *Poland*: Warsaw 1 by Mlle Bernhard.

2. FORMA ORBIS ROMANI and TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—see p. 12.

3. CORPUS PHILOSOPHORUM MEDII AEVI. (i) *Corpus Platonicum*.—As in the Annual Report of the Academy for 1958-9, p. 10. (ii) *Aristoteles Latinus*: For reasons of health Mgr. Mansion had been compelled to resign from the direction of the *Aristoteles Latinus* and Dr. L. Minio-Paluello was invited to take his place. The *Codices descripsit Georgius Lacombe, &c.*, part 1 had been reprinted. Work by H. J. Drossaart-Lulofs on *De Generatione Animalium* was advanced but required a further subvention. Dr. Ilona Opelt of Bonn had made a preliminary examination of the manuscripts in the Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris for the Arab-Latin *Translatio vetus* of the *De Celo et Mundo*. It was decided to hold a conference of all the collaborators (MM. Minio-Paluello, Drossaart-Lulofs, Michaud-Quantin, Mlle Opelt, le R. P. Saffrey and M. Gigon) and MM. Waszink and Aramon i Serra at the Fondation Hardt, Vandoeuvres-Geneva, in October 1959.

4. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—See p. 12.

5. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—See p. 12.

6. CODICES LATINI ANTIQUIORES.—Fascicule VIII of the *Codices Latini antiquiores* had appeared, and fascicule IX was in the press. A fascicule containing *Addenda* and an *Index* would be a necessary addition to the ten fascicules already envisaged. The third volume of the *Chartae Latinae antiquiores* was in the press; it included the papyri and parchments of the British Museum. A further volume, in preparation, would contain documents of the British Isles outside the British Museum,

together with those of Scandinavia, Belgium, the Netherlands, and the U.S.A.

7. CATALOGUS TRANSLATIONUM ET COMMENTARIUM.—Volume I was in the press. The bibliography of printed and written catalogues of Latin manuscripts, dealt with by Professor Kristeller in *Traditio* vi and ix, was in course of revision and a new edition would appear to supplement the *Traditio*.

8. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.—*France*: the volume by Louis Grodecki and Jean Lafond, *Les Vitraux de Notre-Dame et de la Sainte Chapelle de Paris*, had appeared. *Austria*: volume I, *Die Glasmalereien der Wiener Kirchen* by Dr. Eva Frodl, was in the press. From Germany, Belgium, and Spain a number of volumes were reported to be in active preparation. Elsewhere some action had been reported but it would appear that no substantial progress had yet been made.

9. CORPUS OF GREEK AND LATIN INSCRIPTIONS.—M. A. Degrassi had completed the large fascicule on the *Fasti* which would be printed forthwith by the Unione Accademica Nazionale Italiana. In Hungary work had been done upon the preparation of a new edition of volume III of the *Corpus Inscriptionum Latinarum*, and in Great Britain the new edition of volume VII was approaching completion.

10. MEDIEVAL LATIN DICTIONARY.—Articles dealing with *Ma* and *Me* were nearly ready for the press. See also p. 11.
